Finally, the third part of the book considers whether BCPs/CPs, notably through their emphasis on stewardship of nature and tradition, can be seen as problematic arrangements that constrain indigenous peoples within the western imagination without any hope of them reconstructing their identities according to their own visions or whether they can be seen as political tools and representational strategies used by indigenous peoples in their struggle for greater rights to their land, territories and resources and for more political space. This volume will be of great interest to students and scholars of environmental law, indigenous peoples, biodiversity conservation and environmental anthropology. It will also be of great use to professionals and policymakers involved in environmental management and the protection of indigenous rights.
