it used to be said that the sun never set on the empire of the king of spain it was therefore appropriate that emperor charles v should have commissioned from battista agnese in 1543 a world map as a birthday present for his sixteen year old son the future philip ii this was the world as charles v and his successors of the house of austria knew it a world crossed by the golden path of the treasure fleets that linked spain to the riches of the indies it is this world with spain at its center that forms the subject of this book j h elliott the pre eminent historian of early modern spain and its world originally published these essays in a variety of books and journals they have here been grouped into four sections each with an introduction outlining the circumstances in which they were written and offering additional reflections the first section on the american world explores the links between spain and its american possessions the second section the european world extends beyond the castilian center of the iberian peninsula and its catalan periphery to embrace sixteenth and seventeenth century europe as a whole in the world of the court the author looks at the character of the court of the spanish

habsburgs and the perennially uneasy relationship between the world of political power and the world of arts and letters the final section is devoted to the great historical question of the decline of spain a question that continues to resonate in the anglo american world of today

in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries rome was an aged but still vigorous power while spain was a rising giant on track toward becoming the world's most powerful and first truly global empire this book tells the fascinating story of the meeting of these two great empires at a critical moment in european history thomas dandelet explores for the first time the close relationship between the spanish empire and papal rome that developed in the dynamic period of the italian renaissance and the spanish golden age the author examines on the one hand the role the spanish empire played in shaping roman politics economics culture society and religion and on the other the role the papacy played in spanish imperial politics and the development of spanish absolutism and monarchical power reconstructing the large spanish community in rome during this period the book reveals the strategies used by the spanish monarchs and their agents that successfully brought rome and the papacy under their control spanish ambassadors courtiers and merchants in rome carried out a subtle but effective conquest by means of a distinctive informal imperialism which relied largely on patronage politics as spain's power grew rome enjoyed enormous gains as well and the close relations they developed became a powerful influence on the political social economic and religious life not only of the iberian and italian peninsulas but also of catholic reformation europe as a whole

el greco ribera velázquez murillo these are but a few of the great sixteenth and seventeenth century artists of spain's golden age of painting in this authoritative and handsome book an enlarged extended and revised version of his golden age of painting in spain eminent spanish art scholar jonathan brown surveys the development of painting in spain during this fascinating period focusing on the interaction between art and the socioeconomic and political conditions that prevailed in spain's golden age this book offers information about religious beliefs social attitudes the activities of patrons and collectors and how these were absorbed and interpreted by painters the author sets the history of spanish paintings within a european context and explores spain's contact with artistic centers in italy and the netherlands he discusses not only spanish artists but also such non spanish painters as titian ruben and luca giordano who either worked in spain or influenced other artists there brown also examines the collections of foreign paintings that spanish noblemen and prelates assembled and how these collections affected the production of art and the social status of the spanish artist in this up to date and innovative analysis of two hundred years of spanish painting brown describes a country that brilliantly transformed the artistic impulses it received from abroad to fit the needs of its own society

nuanced understanding of the reciprocal nature of Spanish Italian relations and the rich cultural production that was the product of the far reaching exchanges between the two peninsulas throughout the early modern period guides the nineteen essays in this volume the key political reality of sixteenth and seventeenth century Spanish imperial domination in Italy formal Sicily Sardinia Naples Milan informal Rome Genoa Tuscany and more neutral or independent Venice introduces the investigation in this volume into the methods and mechanisms of control and collaboration cooperation and cooptation assimilation and resistance the connections between topics and problems in social administrative economic and cultural history follow from political theory and practice politics society economy and religion help us see both Spain and Italy more clearly

a sumptuous history of golden age Spain that explores the irresistible tension between heavenly and earthly realms incomparable realms offers a vision of Spanish culture and society during the so called golden age the period from 1500 to 1700 when Spain unexpectedly rose to become the dominant European power but in what ways was this a golden age and for whom the relationship between the Habsburg monarchy and the Roman Catholic Church shaped the period with both constructing narratives to bind Spanish society together incomparable realms unpicks the impact of these two historical forces on thought and culture and examines the people and perspectives such powerful projections sought to eradicate the book shows that the tension between the heavenly and earthly realms and in particular the struggle between the spiritual and the corporeal defines golden age culture in art and literature mystical theology and moral polemic ideology doctrine and everyday life the problematic pull of the body and the material world is the unacknowledged force behind early modern Spain life is a dream as the title of Calderón's famous play of the period proclaimed but there is always a body dreaming it

I A Thompson Emeritus Fellow of the Royal Historical Society is the author of *War and Government in Habsburg Spain* a seminal study of the impact of war on the development of the state in Spain in the 16th and 17th centuries in this volume he reprints for an English readership ten essays examining the implications for government the financial system and Spain's position in Europe of the fundamental changes in the art and practice of war both on land and at sea that took place during this period this military revolution has been one of the most contentious debates among historians for the last fifty years but little attention has so far been paid to Spain itself despite her predominance in Europe for much of the period these essays are designed to correct that omission and to assist in a fuller understanding both of the military revolution and of the strengths and weaknesses of the Spanish state

offers an interesting insight on his the author s two protagonists namely their differing experience of conflict in eastern europe the journal of military history the conflict personal rivalry and contrast in personality generalship and command between the two iconic commanders in the thirty years war king gustavus adolphus of sweden for the protestant powers and albrecht von wallenstein duke of friedland more than just commanders at the tactical level they were statesmen military organizers and strategists on a continental scale both commanders represented the 17th century military revolution in action the writing is vivid graphic and detailed without overloading and readers can feel involved in the action from strategic planning to battlefield tactics and even the melee both generals are titanic figures come and their respective deaths gustavus heroically in battle and wallenstein murdered with the emperor s compliance were dramatic highpoints in the long war this is no hagiography and the author analyses the contrasting reputations of two of the greatest military figures in modern history and analyses mistakes as well their triumphs both commanders understanding of the role of the modern state and finance as vital factors in the military revolution and modern warfare a major contrast was gustavus s constant search for the tactical and strategic initiative compared to wallenstein s caution and patience and development of counter punch defensive tactics exceptional for the period a young warrior like an alexander gustavus excelled in inspired battlefield leadership even at huge risk despite his death at lutzen in 1632 he and his steadfast chancellor oxenstierna had decisively defeated the emperor s attempt to subjugate the empire and introduce the catholic counter reformation gustavus contributed hugely to the ending of habsburg supremacy while advancing new concepts in modern war his death ushered in his acolytes including generals baner saxe weimar and torstensson gustavus or wallenstein the greater of the two the reader must judge but napoleon included gustavus in his list of ten greats with julius caesar hannibal barca and alexander the great

the famous historian looks at his own research and historical scholarship to examine the difficulty of writing the history of a nation other than one s own and the way that the study of history has changed in the last half century

for nearly two centuries spain was the world s most influential nation dominant in europe and with authority over immense territories in america and the pacific because none of this was achieved by its own economic or military resources henry kamen sets out to explain how it achieved the unexpected status of world power and examines political events and foreign policy through the reigns of each of the nation s rulers from ferdinand and isabella at the end of the fifteenth century to philip v in the 1700s he explores the distinctive features that made up the spanish experience from the gold and silver of the new

world to the role of the inquisition and the fate of the muslim and jewish minorities in an entirely re written text he also pays careful attention to recent work on art and culture social development and the role of women as well as considering the obsession of spaniards with imperial failure and their use of the concept of decline to insist on a mythical past of greatness the essential fragility of spain s resources he explains was the principal reason why it never succeeded in achieving success as an imperial power this completely updated fourth edition of henry kamen s authoritative accessible survey of spanish politics and civilisation in the golden age of its world experience substantially expands the coverage of themes and takes account of the latest published research
